Reading Mark 6 v 14 – 29

Now King Herod heard about all this, because Jesus' reputation had spread everywhere. Some people were saying, "John the Baptist has come back to life! That is why he has this power to perform miracles." Others, however, said, "He is Elijah." Others said, "He is a prophet, like one of the prophets of long ago." When Herod heard it, he said, "He is John the Baptist! I had his head cut off, but he has come back to life!" Herod himself had ordered John's arrest, and he had him tied up and put in prison. Herod did this because of Herodias, whom he had married, even though she was the wife of his brother Philip. John the Baptist kept telling Herod, "It isn't right for you to marry your brother's wife!" So Herodias held a grudge against John and wanted to kill him, but she could not because of Herod. Herod was afraid of John because he knew that John was a good and holy man, and so he kept him safe. He liked to listen to him, even though he became greatly disturbed every time he heard him. Finally, Herodias got her chance. It was on Herod's birthday, when he gave a feast for all the top government officials, the military chiefs, and the leading citizens of Galilee. The daughter of Herodias came in and danced, and pleased

Herod and his guests. So the king said to the girl, "What would you like to have? I will give you anything you want." With many vows he said to her, "I swear that I will give you anything you ask for, even as much as half my kingdom!" So the girl went out and asked her mother, "What shall I ask for?" "The head of John the Baptist," she answered. The girl hurried back at once to the king and demanded, "I want you to give me here and now the head of John the Baptist on a plate!" This made the king very sad, but he could not refuse her because of the vows he had made in front of all his guests. So he sent off a guard at once with orders to bring John's head. The guard left, went to the prison, and cut John's head off; then he brought it on a plate and gave it to the girl, who gave it to her mother. When John's disciples heard about this, they came and got his body, and buried it.

Address

Daughters have Dads just where they want them. When our daughter Anna looked at me with those pleading eyes, how could I not give in and grant her every wish? So I understand, although in no way do I condone, poor Herod! Those scheming women in his life took advantage of his drunkenness and Herodias got her way! Herod, like Pilate some time later, is portrayed as a weak man, who knows what is right, even appreciates the words of the holy man – John or Jesus – and yet does the wrong thing, condemning them to death. Life, like this story, is all about making choices, and who or what influences those decisions.

It is difficult to be sure why Mark puts this story at this point, within the story of the disciples going out on their mission. (I note it didn't appear in earlier Lectionaries!) There seem to be two main aims: firstly, to create a parallel with Jesus' death and resurrection. John the Baptist, of course, did not return to life, although his ministry is fulfilled by Jesus.

Secondly, and this is the point I want to pursue, the story is about Herod who hears the word of God, and even enjoys listening to it, but still ends up making the wrong choice. There was a craze a while ago among a number of Christians, especially young people, to wear wristbands with the letters WWJD – meaning What Would Jesus Do? For all of us who struggle to make the right choices in life, asking that question can help us in our decision-making. But we also have to acknowledge other factors that influence our selection. For instance, family and personal history can exercise a strong influence; whether it is pressure put on directly, like a daughter coming up to you with those puppy-begging eyes, or the subconscious fear of upsetting your parents or partner and need to seek

their approval. We are often predisposed towards a family preference in our conclusions. Herod is also caught up in the web of peer pressure. Having made a promise to his daughter that she can having anything she asks for, up to half of his kingdom, he cannot then refuse her request because he would lose face among his guests. It is so easy to make a slip and then, even when we know we have said or done something wrong, we refuse to take it back because it might make us look bad. We often make choices based on other people's opinions of us, even if we know our original decision was mistaken. You can see young people doing it when they follow the crowd and end up in trouble when, in other circumstances, they wouldn't be so foolish. But older people do it too, we also do not want to seem weak or out of step with the crowd, so we end up in the wrong even when we know exactly what is right. Time and again the Bible teaches that to make a mistake is forgivable, God understands and in love forgives. But it also teaches that the worse wrong we can do is when we consciously do the opposite to what we know is right. Herod, at times listening to John the Baptist knows what is right in the sight of God. But reluctantly, like a moth drawn to a light, for political, family and face-saving reasons, he goes against his better judgement and grants his wife and daughter's wish.

It is not just humans who have to make good decisions or choices. God's choices sometimes seem quite contrary to those we would make, but are always for our benefit. In Ephesians chapter 1 we read, "God had already chosen us to be his through our union with Christ, so that we would be holy and without fault before him, because of his love". Although human beings are sinners God chooses in our favour, and offers forgiveness in place of punishment. And "All things are done according to God's plan and decision". The world is not proceeding at random, it is governed by God's choices; and even when we go against God's ways he has the power to bring things back to his plan and has all eternity to make it happen. And within all this he has provided a guide and strength for when we make our choices: the wisdom of the Holy Spirit. "The Spirit is the guarantee that we shall receive what God has promised his people and this assures us that God will give complete freedom to those who are his".

Thank God we have been given the freedom to choose; thank God we can seek guidance as we make those choices; thank God that by grace even when we make the wrong choices God sets us back on the right path and forgives us. The warning of the reading is to know the will of God but also the consequences of not heeding it.
